How to use this book




The <u>focus words</u> are underlined when there is a focus word box on the page.

The <u>focus word</u> boxes provide a prompt for thinking about the <u>focus words</u>. Don't worry if your child doesn't know the meaning of the <u>focus words</u> immediately.



Encourage your child to read independently, with expression and at their own pace. Remember to praise your child's efforts! Ideally your child should read the book more than once to gain a thorough understanding of the text and to become fluent with the <u>focus words</u>.

After reading, talk about the focus words and any other words that you or your child found interesting. Carry on talking about the focus words whenever a chance comes up in daily life, or when reading other books.



Chapter 1 Winter has arrived

Long, long ago ...

Even though it snowed every year, Ivan still gasped in amazement at the beautiful <u>scene</u> around him. Fir trees glimmered as though sprinkled with diamonds. Close your eyes and picture the <u>scene</u> in front of Ivan. What else might he see? What might he hear and feel?



When he had finished, Sophia began to laugh ... and laugh ... and laugh.

Everyone was overjoyed to see Sophia smiling again, especially the king.

"I <u>demand</u> that you come and see us every week, Ivan!" the king said.

Lots of people wanted to hear Ivan's precious stories. Do you have any stories that are special to you?

Comprehension

Before reading

- Ask your child to read the title of the book and the back cover information.
- Ask: What sorts of things make you laugh?
- Ask: What was the last funny story you read?

During reading

- Your child should be able to read most of the words in this book confidently, using their phonics skills. For any challenging words, encourage your child to say and blend the sounds, then help with the tricky part if necessary or simply read the word to them.
- On page 2 ask: Why do you think the sheep needed bringing home before it got dark?
- On page 14 ask: Why didn't Princess Sophia leave her room?

After reading

- Ask your child to tell you in their own words what happened in the story and what they thought of it.
- Look back at the story. Ask: Why was Sophia so sad at the beginning?
- Ask: What happened on Sophia's birthday that helped her feel better?
- Look at pages 8–9. Ask: Can you explain what happens in The Whispering Bear story?
- Look at page 19. Ask: Think of a word that is the opposite of 'chaos'?
- Look at page 22. Ask: How often does the king want Ivan to visit Sophia and why?

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Princess Sophia refuses to leave her room. Will Ivan be able to make her laugh again?

This story is a folktale from Montenegro.

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
