5 steps to becoming a smart saver!



STEP 1

Ryder Carroll, a US designer, has a great idea: **he** suggests a money journal in a notebook, also called a bullet journal. Make a list of all the things you buy and add pictures (the pictures help you remember them). Each week, check your journal. Are you saving money? Make a plan: next week, I'm not going to waste my money!

STEP 2

A lot of banks recommend the 50-30-20 rule: **it** helps you organize how you spend your money. When you get some money, spend 50% on things you need, 30% on things you want and save 20%. You'll save a lot this way!

STEP 3

Famous British money expert, Martin Lewis, says that only *you* can control your spending. Before you buy something, always ask, can I afford it? Remember, shops want to sell things – **they** are not going to help you to save!

STEP 4

Shops and shopping websites are great for new things, but you can buy used things, too. On the Wallapop™ app, for example, you can buy second-hand clothes, shoes, books and music cheaper than in the shops.

STEP 5

Look around your bedroom. Do you wear all those clothes? Are you going to read those books again? Put **them** on Wallapop or another app – it's a great way to earn money!


